This new program has been launched for 2010 with 22 members and 30 cars participating. The primary purpose of the program is to encourage members to drive our Model A's. A few (volunteers) of the participants will be designing the new 1000 Mile Patch over the next few weeks and will be awarded at the end of 2010 for those who achieved 1000 miles minimum.

We will also report our mileage to MAFCA on a quarterly basis to help them achieve their goal of 1 million miles by the end of September. Currently Ed Reiser and Lindell Duncan are racking up miles fast --- each with well over 300 since January 1 --- they are leaving me in the dust or should I say mud these days!!??. From my perspective that is quite good given the winter we have been having. We will keep you posted as we progress through the year.

A sheet will be available at the booth for members to indicate when they are willing to man the area. We need someone there from show's start to finish daily. That helps assure the cars are not damaged. We ask that participates not open any cars (doors, hoods, rumble seats) for spectators to set in or inspect unless it is your own car.


The club will receive some show passes for participants to use. If there are spares, we will be able to share with non-participants. Please try to share your passes as much as possible.

Removal of cars will begin after all spectators have left the arena, approximately 7 p.m.

We have 20 vehicles registered to participate in the Tulsa International Auto Show. That is the maximum we can accommodate. If you did not register, we can still put you on a waiting list should we get a cancellation but we can not guarantee you a spot.

Dillinger's getaway car sells for \$165,000



A 1930 Ford Model A used by bank robber John Dillinger to evade federal agents sold at auction recently for \$165,000. The winning bidder's name was not disclosed. Don't guess it was anyone in our club, however!

This car was used in Dillinger's 1934 escape from the Little Bohemia Lodge in Manitowish Waters, Wis. The owner of the resort tipped off FBI agents that Dillinger and his gang were there.

A team of agents attempted to surround the resort, but Dillinger and his 2 partners escaped to a nearby house where they found the Model A. They forced its owner to drive them to safety.

Later, the car caught the attention of police and one of the partners, Hamilton, was fatally wounded in a gun fight. The car still bears a bullet hole and the stains of Hamilton's blood. Dillinger later ditched the car in Chicago and stole a 1934 Ford V8 in its place.

The car was eventually returned to its original owner, who left it parked in his garage and left the damage untouched. A subsequent owner, who purchased the car 30 years later for \$1,400, also left it untouched. Temporary cosmetic repairs were done to the car in 2007 for the movie.

In general, Model A Fords are not particularly rare or valuable, even today. The appraisal Web site Nadaguides.com would place a market value on an ordinary 1930 Model A Coupe with a rumble seat at about \$13000. Don't we all wish this car had been ours to sell?


2nd Annual Ladies Day Out Saturday, May 22 Savory Chef


From Your Board by Ken Brust
