DRIVE THOSE MODEL A'S: 1000 MILE PATCH

A little background on this program is needed. At the January meeting I had introduced a potential program tracking our Model A mileage in 2010 in conjunction with a program the Oklahoma City club was going to participate. When discussed at our meeting and via email I had conveyed MAFCA had a "Touring Award" based on achieving 25,000 or 50,000 miles accumulatively. I had originally thought this was the program OKC was talking about but since have learned I was in error. Oklahoma City has actually developed their own program to track mileage, 1000 Mile Patch. Tracking our mileage is also in conjunction with MAFCA attempting to accumulatively drive 1 million miles between January 1, 2010 and September 30, 2010. MAFCA will post those clubs participating on their website.

The Board has agreed to adopt the 1000 Mile Patch for our Club. We will develop our patch in the near future. If you want to participate please provide Roy Cail your odometer reading (either by email, postal. or at our next meeting) as of January 1 – you may have to estimate miles assuming you have driven your A in 2010. I have set up a database to capture the miles by owner and car. A few of you have already provided me your initial odometer reading by car -- you can have multiple cars. We will also provide the mileage to MAFCA so we could participate in their 1 million mile endeavor. My contact details are as follows: phone, 299-5691 or roycail@cox.net.

Just for your information, Lindell is off and running with over 300 miles (combined pickup and car) already --- now that lays down a real challenge for some of us.



CAUSING SOME HELL ON THE BORDER

We should have known that with the group we were taking on a Fall Foliage Tour to Van Buren and Ft. Smith, AR, trouble would be brewing. After all, Ft. Smith has been dubbed as the city of "hell on the border." Lots of famous outlaws got their starts and ended their crime-sprees in Judge Parker's territory. Hanging Judge Parker and his US Marshalls did not take kindly to the ruckus caused by the gangsters. Hanging gallows are evidence of that.

The annual Tulsa and Sooner (Oklahoma City) Model A Ford Clubs' Fall Foliage Tour started without any signs of trouble. We gathered in the community of Haskell to get our directions and goodie bags. Those bags contained some great items donated by many of the businesses we frequent as Model A'ers.

Then, trouble began. Don Reed flattened one tire and split a rim. It only took about two-dozen guys a couple of minutes to put him back on the road.

From there it was off to Sallisaw, once in part of Indian Territory before Oklahoma's statehood.

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These "parts" produced some of the "finest" gangsters around. One of those gangsters was Charles Arthur Floyd, also known as Pretty Boy Floyd. Floyd was a bank robber. A few people died from his bullets. To the folks around Sallisaw, he was almost like a modern-day Robin Hood. He sometimes shared his loot



with others, especially if they helped him avoid getting caught. Floyd was long saddled with a nickname he despised. The hill folk around Sallisaw were duly impressed by the fact he was never without a pocket comb. They studied his slick-as-axle-grease pompadour and dubbed him "Pretty Boy." Years later when he was deep in criminality, the nickname resurfaced even though he had tried to keep it secret. The name irritated Floyd right up to the moment he lay dying in an Ohio cornfield. Famed FBI agent Melvin Purvis stood over him and said, "You're Pretty Boy Floyd." The dying gangster flared, "I'm Charles Arthur Floyd."

Floyd was killed on Oct. 22, 1934. He requested years before his death to be buried near Sallisaw. Some reports estimated that 20,000 people came to his funeral. Others reported upwards of 40,000 mourners and spectators.

Being as we were passing by the area exactly 75 years and a day after his death, we found it "fitting" to visit his gravesite. After all, he was known to drive Model A's. For that alone, we could pay our "respects." One of our "gang," Rick Jensen, surprised us. He pulled out his trusted (toy) machine gun and knelt at the grave. He looked suspiciously like a gangster himself. Might Floyd's gang exist among us?

From there we went to the site of Sequoyah's cabin. Sequoyah was the son of a white father and a Cherokee mother. He studied the sounds and syllables of the Cherokee language and developed an alpha-

bet of symbols for the language. His original cabin is beautifully preserved inside a building built in the 1930s as a WPA project.

Now it was time to really start checking out the hills of the once lawless eastern Oklahoma where many gangsters found their refuge. Blazing in all the brilliant colors of autumn, the hills provided us with spectacular scenery. Cows, goats, buzzards and a few folks watched as we made our way over the hills and around many curves.



We crossed the border into Arkansas and wound our way into the Victorian town of Van Buren. Things were looking calm and peaceful. A walk around the downtown area and a feast of Mexican food made the 150 mile trip worthwhile. However, there was still much more in store for us. Things were not as peaceful as they appeared.

Saturday morning we gathered for breakfast before leaving for a driving tour into Ft. Smith. We took a slow drive through the Belle Grove District to see the historical houses. Next, we drove to the U.S. National Cemetery. Graves of soldiers from past wars are row upon row. They date as far back as the Civil War era. We were awed by the peacefulness and beauty of the site.

Frontier Fest was going on in Ft. Smith, and we were invited guests. We parked our cars for festival attendees to see. Members shopped, toured downtown Ft. Smith, and visited with on-lookers. The city has a fine historical museum, an old brothel-turned-visitor's center, trolley, 1920s era amusement park, and other great attractions.

Lurking nearby were the gallows from Hangin' Judge Parker's days as well as the Judge's courtroom

where many criminals were sentenced to hang. A sign nearby announced plans for a National US Marshall's Museum. Those should be warnings enough to not cause any trouble while in Ft. Smith.

If you recall, trouble was brewing within the group on this tour! We just didn't know who nor how much.

Near the time we had planned to depart Ft. Smith, one of our members, Bob Soper, hopped into his 1929 Blindback Sedan and left. He pulled in front of the bank and stopped. Out of the bank walked Henry Starr and his partner; into Soper's car they jumped. A bank hold-up had just occurred, and Soper was their getaway guy! In "HOT PERSUIT" was a 1930 Model A sedan with a former banker on running board and our member Marvin Mellage driving. Quick-on-the-gas Marvin, acting really "cool and important," failed to turn on his siren and red light. Suddenly, the getaway car stopped. A gunfight began. Poor Henry Starr, he lay shot on the streets of Ft. Smith. Starr had been shot in the back by the former president of the bank. He "died" three days later. The other robber surrendered. As for Soper, he slipped back into the parking lot where he hid himself and his car among the clubs' fleets of A's.

Our club had just helped to reenact the first recorded bank robbery to have used an automobile as the getaway car. The actual robbery was in Harrison AR on February 18, 1921. Albeit seven years before the Model A era, the spectators found it entertaining. Bob Soper will forever be our official "Bad Guy." He was glad to leave Ft. Smith before Judge Parker's sentencing.

Trouble had not ended for us yet. The evening was filled with a visit from the ladies-of-the-night,



Miss Laura, a preacher and the doctor. The preacherman seemed to recognize some of our ladies including our dear Sunday-going Connie. He told us he knew her from his Tuesday night visits to calm her soul. The good doctor claimed to have cured Tulsa club member Virginia's "bunions" and asked if they

were bothering her anymore. Sure was kind of him to inquire. The city of Ft. Smith hired him to "certify" Miss Laura's girls' health conditions, too.



The days of the brothels that lined the riverbank border between Arkansas and Indian Territory during the 1800s are gone, but the stories aren't. The ghosts of Miss Laura, the ladies, and the gentlemen of those days live on. Miss Laura' Players performed a lively musical rendition of those days and tried to stir up a bit of rumor and trouble for some of our distinguished "gentlemen," especially Tulsa MAFC President Lindell Duncan and member Jerry Conrad.

When Sunday came, we knew it was time for us to high-tail-it out of town and cross that border back into Oklahoma and the safety of home. Except for one last bit of trouble, a broken fan belt on "Machine Gun" Jensen's car, we made it back just fine. Our "gang" of mechanics made fast work of the repairs.

Our adventures were planned by Roy and Barbara Cail and Lindell and Mayleta Duncan. We had over 60 members and guests from the Tulsa Model A Ford Club and the Oklahoma City Sooner Club attend. Yearly, we do tours together. But, usually we don't cause "hell on the border!"






