#### THE FINER POINTS

We made it back from Asheville and gee did we have fun! Nothing reinvigorates me for Model A's like a national meet! I always enjoy the swap meet, and this year I found an original dealer poster for a 1930 Cabriolet.

This year, I entered my original and unrestored 1928 Roadster into Fine Point under the original category in the hopes of obtaining at least 250 points for the MARC of Originality. To me, nice original cars are fascinating because they show us how Ford actually assembled the cars (assuming they haven't been messed with too much). Since the cars are approaching 100 years old, original and unrestored cars are becoming less common. Especially cars that still sport their original paint. Original open cars are very uncommon, and open cars that still retain their original top and interior are rarer still. So, here she is in all her glory: my September 1928 Roadster with 30,000 original miles.




The best part about original cars are all the details we can see. So, let's take a look at the below photo of the driver's side of the engine. There are not any reproduction parts pictured here. What stands out to me first is the fan shroud used through 1928. Notice how the part does not look smooth on the side. That's because the shroud was stamped out and dipped in black enamel paint. Ford did not waste time eliminating the draw marks from the stamping process. Additionally, the generator with the cut out on the side is an early part as well as the early design starter switch. If you look closely, you can see the number "8 1 28" stamped into the gas tank signifying the date the tank passed inspection. Contrary to popular belief, that is not the date the car rolled off the assembly line. The motor was one of 3,602 motors assembled on August 3, 1928 at the Rouge factory.



Now, let's move to the passenger side of the engine compartment. From this view, you can see the solid front motor mount at the front cross member. Additionally, the original tail pipe and the engine pan are both visible. Unlike later styles, the front of the engine pans attach to the front cross member.

You can also see how the first design muffler was curved to bend around the engine mount.



Looking at the front end, you can see the original finishes, and how it matches the Restoration Guidelines. Brake parts were generally dipped in black enamel before assembly. Clearly the backing plate has a different type of paint than the axle. My main goal with this car was to clean it and to ensure everything worked. For the original class of judging, you do not want to repaint parts as that can result in an "Over Restored" deduction. Isn't it amazing how much original paint has survived?

Finer Points continued from page 2 - Next, we can take a look at one of the wheels. Obviously, the tire had to be replaced to make the car safe to drive. Everything else is original including the valve stem, short lug nuts, and early hub cap. The red centering line on the tire is how it would have come from the factory.



For its age, the interior is, in my opinion, in very nice shape. The tucks along the front corner of the cushion are very visible, and you can see the welting on the cushion was not raised up to the edge.



There are a few interesting features on the car such as this double French Gray pin stripe. Ford specified one stripe for the cars. Yet this one clearly has two. Maybe the line was moving slowly that day and the pin stripers got bored. This stripe pattern would most likely receive a deduction on a restored car because the typical Model "A" did not have it. This photo also provides a close up of the top grain material. The grain ran horizontal rather than vertical like most reproduction tops do.

Finer Points continued from page 4 - It's also possible to see little details with this car such as how Ford only buffed the front of the bumpers leaving the top, bottom, and back dull.



Of course, an open car would not be complete without side curtains, and this Roadster just happens to have a complete set. You can see how the curtains are made from strips of top material rather than one large piece with a hole cut out for a window like most reproductions are. Additionally, rivets are present to add strength to the curtains in wear areas. Some of the sections are thicker than others due to reinforcement being sewn in strategic places.



So, I started off by saying I was hoping to receive 250 out of 500 points for the car. That is the threshold for the "MARC of Originality". The next threshold for original cars is 400 points for the "Award of Excellence". The Roadster scored 450 points! It was the highest scoring original car at the meet. Of course, it also passed the 14 points for blue ribbon judging and received the blue ribbon. Below is a photo of the two awards it received.



I hope you've enjoyed a few of the details of my car. It really is a time capsule and one of my absolute favorites. I'm thinking I'll keep it around for a long time. I'll leave you with one final closeup.
