THE FINER POINTS

Autumn is getting closer which means it is either time to start rolling up the windows or installing side curtains. Since I'm an open car guy, I guess that means side curtains for me. Side curtains can be a tricky proposition in a Model "A". It can be exceedingly difficult to get a good fit, and very few upholstery shops know how the original curtains were constructed. Even Lebaron Bonney did not know!

Originally, standard side curtains were made from strips of top material sewn together with plastic (referred to as isinglass) in the center for a window. Below if the passenger side curtain from my original and unrestored 1928 Roadster. Although it is hard to tell from the photo, the vertical pieces have an extra "stiffener" piece sewn into the material for added strength.





A closer look reveals how Ford added rivets to strategic parts of the curtain for added strength. You can also see the rough edge on the bottom left corner.

There are more details we can see when looking at the back side of the same curtain. You can clearly see the two pieces are riveted together. Most reproduction curtains do not have these pieces attached in any way, but it is important because it helps to seal up

the car. Also, you can see the wind seal on the left side of the curtain that overlaps the stanchion and helps seal up the car. This is another part that is frequently left off reproduction curtains. The position of the fasteners on these parts do not vary because of the precision of Next, let's look at the quarter curtain for my Roadster. Unfortunately, the isinglass has seen better days, but it's still not bad for nearly 100 years old! It is made in much the same as the door curtain. Most reproduction



tops do not have the attachment hardware for the top, center fastener. This is particularly problematic when trying to get the car sealed up because this portion of

the curtain can easily push in without the fastener.



So, let's look at a direct comparison between an original curtain and a reproduction. Can you tell which one is original? Ha! This is the quarter window for a Standard Phaeton. As you can see, the reproduction has a similar shape, but is easily recognizable as not being made correctly. Additionally, the isinglass is much smaller on the reproduction. The windows being too small and in the wrong position is largely my biggest complaint for most reproduction curtains.

Of course, there is a reason most side curtains today are made from one piece of fabric with a hole cut out of the center, and I bet you can guess what that reason is. It is because it is exceedingly easier to make, and that allows the cost to be far less.

Over time, original curtains do shrink, and can no longer be installed without the risk of damaging them. However, when curtains are properly constructed, they look wonderful and really do seal up the car quite well. Although probably not quite as well as a window! Ha! Below is a photo of Dad's curtains on his Henry winning Roadster. Don't they look just like my original curtains only newer?



Of course, it is up to the restorer on how accurate they want their curtains to be. The only advice I would give you is to make sure the windows are in the correct position and the proper size. Otherwise, it can make it quite difficult to see out.

Special Message

As most of you know, Rus and Sandy Shuler have been dealing with some health issues. They can no longer drive their Model A, so Lonie and Kelly now drive it. They have moved into a senior living center which they enjoy and feel very comfortable in. Ever since Rus joined our club, he and I have seemed to really bond and I've stayed in touch with him. He recently sent a note to his closest friends and family about his health and said I could share it with our fellow club members. Following is note from Rus:

"Some of you know parts of this, some don't, but this is the latest update of my health. We have known of my coughing, the loss of hearing, loss of balance, Hodgkins Lymphoma in my blood for some time, but the (previously almost dormant) fibrosis in my lungs has grown significantly in the past few months. I now have an oxygen generator that I use anytime I'm active. Last Monday, I met with my Pulmonologist to discuss the fibrosis. He also showed me the new PET scan of my chest that shows a growth of cancer in my lower throat and upper chest. Based on what he sees and knows, estimated lifespan of 3 months to year for me. After discussion, we agreed it might be time for me to consider Hospice. Yesterday, Thursday, I signed up with Hospice. For now, hospice considers me as high functioning and we make no changes in our lifestyle, but the nurse and others will meet with us frequently in the next few days to establish a routine and overall plan. I don't know what the future holds, but right now, with the shortness of breath, oxygen tubes, overall weakness, loss of balance, loss of hearing, irritation in throat, etc., my quality of life sucks. And, I think the pulmonologist was very optimistic with his time estimate (as he should be). We will stay here at Bellarose as long as I can, and Sandy can stay here after I'm gone. There is nothing we can do but wait - God is in control and God always is right."

Rus told me, "You probably won't see me at any more MAFC meetings, It was my privilege to be a member of the club for those couple years and I still have great memories. I still wear the club shirts proudly. I wish I could have joined years ago to enjoy the experience (and the cars) longer but..."
